Vladimir Putin

- Former intelligence agent.
- In power since 1999. In 2021, signed law enabling him to stay in power until 2036.
- Authoritarian regime, corruption, the circle of oligarchs.
- Imperialist motives, establishment of the "Greater Russia", USSR nostalgia.
- "I see the collapse of the Soviet Union as a great tragedy of the XX century."
- Misinterpretations and manipulations of historic events.
- Claims that Ukraine is not a country.

• Former comedian. • Jewish descendant. •Starred in a tv-show called "Servant of the People", playing Ukraine's president. •In power since 2019. • Pro-EU, pro-NATO. • Refused to leave Kyiv, even after being targeted directly. • Gained worldwide admiration and respect. • Direct & regular speeches.

Ukraine's origins

- Kyivan Rus (9th 11th centuries) Grand Duchy of Lithuania (ca. 1320-1569)
- Polish-Lithuanian
 - Commonwealth (1569–1795)
- Ukraine in the Russian Empire $(18^{th}c - 1917)$
- Ukrainian People's Republic (1917 - 1921)
- USSR (1921-1991)
- Ukraine (1991-)







Ukraine — regional differences

• While they exist, they are not insurmountable and do not easily split on east/west, Ukrainian/Russian axis. Galicia (western) and Donbass (eastern) regions at opposite extremes.

- leverage.

Spread the idea of separation, provoke and manipulate the minority

Attack the targeted region/community and blame their government

 Cyberattacks - first used against Georgia in 2008, used against Ukraine later; Russia targets the country's government websites, starting cyber-

 Invade the targeted country, claiming that they are protecting the humanitarian



-> 2004 - pro-Russian Yanukovych won elections, however, international monitors doubted the elections.

-> Orange Revolution. Results deemed invalid, pro-European **Yushchenko** wins new elections.

-> 2010 - Yanukovych wins elections.

-> 2013 - Yanukovych stopped trade talks with the EU, instead pursuing a similar agreement with Russia, crowds gathered in Kyiv's **Maidan** or Independent square.

-> As 2014 began, authorities grew more violent. The opposition and government reached a truce and Yanukovych fled to Russia.

-> Mysterious, unidentified soldiers appear in **Crimea**. The Crimean parliament voted to secede from Ukraine and join Russia. **Russia annexes Crimea**.

-> The events in Crimea had inspired pro Russian separatists in two other regions Donetsk and Luhansk, collectively known as the **Donbass**.

• February 28 - Peace talks on the Belarusian border yield no results. Zelenskyy calls for fast-track membership of the EU "via a new special procedure".

Comparison: Russo-Georgian War, 2008

- After months of tensions, on August 7, 2008, the Russian army invaded Georgia and started a full-scale war.
- Russia refrained from capturing Tbilisi and agreed to a ceasefire on August 12 under a six-point agreement mediated by Nicolas Sarkozy.
- On August 26, Russia invaded Abkhazia and South Ossetia / Tskhinvali. "Independence" was recognized.
- 20% of Georgian territory is still occupied by Russia.
- At least 230.000 people displaced, around a 1000 of official casualties.

Costs so far

- Civilians: UN report 2600;
 Ukraine's government 25,000.
- UAF, NGU, Volunteers: 2000-4000 (US officials).
- Russian Forces: RU government 1351; US officials -10,000-15,000.
- 200+ children killed.
- 6.5 million Ukrainians left their homes.
- Chernobyl held by Russians.
- Attack on the biggest nuclear power plant in Europe (Zaporizhzhia).



Hell in Mariupol

- The city of Mariupol has been battered by Russian airstrikes in recent weeks. Among the buildings hit have been a maternity hospital, a theater and an arts school. It is estimated that at least 20,000 civilians have died and some 80% of homes have been destroyed
- The Ukrainian army's resistance there has been a fuel for the Ukrainian people.
- As a port city, Mariupol is important economically. The city is in a strategic place militarily.

- Massive demonstrations of support
- Charity organisations, donations
- Condemnation of Russia's politics

The reaction of the West

- Harsh sanctions.
- Isolating not only Russian government, but Russia as a country — sports, education, shops, entertainment.
- Financial and military aid to Ukraine.
- Stopping Nord Stream 2.
- Kicking Russia out of SWIFT.
- Boris Johnson (UK) actively supporting Ukraine and suggesting ways to "fail Putin".
- Olaf Scholz (GER) changing Germany's FP concerning Kremlin drastically.
- Typically neutral states (e.g. Switzerland, Sweden) imposing sanctions and no-fly zones against Russia.
- Zelenskyy demands NATO to announce a no-fly zone over Ukraine.

Reactions in Russia

- Anti-war protests in Saint-Petersburg, Moscow, other big cities.
- So far, more than 15000 people detained at anti-war protests.

Russian Reality

- Propaganda, disinformation, ignorance of war.
- Most of TV is owned by the government; the only opposition channel — Dojd — was closed in the beginning of the war.
- New law with jail terms of up to 15 years for spreading "fake news" & fines for anyone calling for sanctions against Russia following the invasion of Ukraine.
- Putin's approval ratings have always been high (60-70%). The ratings don't seem to change.



Possible scenarios

- Ukraine wins, the long-awaited regime change in Russia.
- Russia occupies the whole of Ukraine, overthrows (potentially eliminates) Zelenskyy and establishes a pro-Kremlin government in Kyiv (Yanukovych is rumoured to be in Belarus).
- Russia splits Ukraine into two

parts - pro-European Western and pro-Russian Eastern Ukraine.

- Regime change inside of Russia

 Russian people/Putin's circle
 overthrow Putin.
- Reaching of a consensus as a result of peace talks.
